SCRIPTURE of the DAY

This message speaks powerfully to our families today. The family is often called the “domestic church,” a place where God’s love is first experienced and shared. **Just as Jesus remains in constant communication with the Father, families too are invited to cultivate open and loving communication with one another.** When family members take time to listen, to speak kindly, and to understand each other’s struggles and joys, they reflect the unity of Jesus and the Father.

In a world that often promotes individualism and division, family accompaniment is essential in building a loving and peaceful home. At the heart of this accompaniment is prayer—just as Jesus intercedes for his disciples, families too are called to pray for one another, entrusting each member to God’s care and grace. When parents pray for their children, spouses pray for each other, and families come together in shared prayer, they strengthen the bonds of love that unite them.

Walking Together in Loving Communication and Prayer

In the Gospel today, Jesus lifts his eyes to heaven and prays to the Father. This prayer, often called the “High Priestly Prayer,” reveals first, the strong relationship of Jesus with his Father and secondly, the deep love Jesus has for his disciples. He prays not only for their protection but also that they may remain united and continue the mission entrusted to them.
